**Instructions on How to File a Small Claims Lawsuit**

Use this packet to file a court case for money if the amount is \$5,000 or less, not including court costs (fees for using the court). When you are done, file the case with the Clerk of the District Court – Small Claims Division.

This Small Claims Lawsuit form has five (5) parts:

- Part 1: Statement and Reason for Claim
- Part 2: Military Service Affidavit
- Part 3: Expert Witness
- Part 4: No Appeal
- Part 5: Signature and Notary

**Part 1 – Statement and Reason for Claim**

**Plaintiff:** The plaintiff is the person who files a court case for money. You are the plaintiff in this case.

**Defendant:** The defendant is the person or company who owes you money.

There may be more than one plaintiff or defendant in a case. If you have more than one plaintiff or defendant, see page 6 to add the information.

Use this section to tell the court about yourself and the defendant. Tell the court how much the defendant owes you and why.

**Part 2 – Military Service Affidavit**

Federal law protects servicemembers who are defendants in a lawsuit while they are deployed or on active duty. This protects the servicemember from a court judgment (decision of the lawsuit) entered against them without first receiving notice of the lawsuit and a chance to defend the case. Find the law: 50 U.S.C.A. § 3931 and G.L. 1956 § 30-7-10.

### **Part 3 – Expert Witness**

### **Part 4 – No Appeal**

I understand that I must give up my right to an appeal. An appeal is when another court reviews your case. By law, you must agree that even if you do not like the outcome of the case, you cannot challenge the decision made by the judge. Find the law: G.L. 1956 § 10-16-4(b).

**Part 5 – Signature and Notary**



You must sign this form in front of a notary. A notary is a person authorized by law to confirm your identity and certify that you signed this form. **Wait to sign this form until you are with the notary. If you fail to sign this form in front of a notary, the court will not accept and file your claim.**

Step 1: **Make one (1) copy of this form, pages 2 to 5.**

Step 2: **File the completed form, pages 2 to 5,** with the Clerk of the District Court – Small Claims Division at the address checked below.

### PLEASE NOTE

If the plaintiff is a corporation with assets under \$1 million, you must file this form in the division of the District Court where the defendant resides. If the assets are over \$1 million, you must be represented by an attorney.

Step 3: **You must print** the Answer to Small Claims Lawsuit and the four (4) Language Assistance Notices in Cambodian, English, Portuguese, and Spanish from the Judiciary’s website at [www.courts.ri.gov](http://www.courts.ri.gov) under the heading of forms.

Step 4: **Bring the packet** (this Small Claims Lawsuit form **pages 2 to 5**, the Summons that the court will give you, Answer to Small Claims Lawsuit, and four (4) Language Assistance Notices) to the sheriff’s office (670 New London Avenue, Cranston, RI, (401) 275-2900) or to a licensed constable (located on the website for

the Department of Business Regulations at <https://dbr.ri.gov/real-estate-and-commercial-licensing/constables>) to be served. Service is delivery of the paperwork to the defendant in person so the defendant has notice of the lawsuit and may answer.

**Step 5: Keep a copy for your records.**

**Step 6: If the defendant does not answer the lawsuit,** the court can enter a judgment by default. This means the court can order the defendant to pay you the money you are owed without the defendant being there.

**Step 7: If the defendant does answer the lawsuit,** the court will refer the case to mediation. You must contact the mediator by the date in the notice that the court will send to you.

**Step 8: Prepare for trial.** If the mediation was not successful, the court will send you a hearing notice with a trial date. Gather evidence, witnesses, and plan what you are going to say.
